MOTHERLAND by Maria Hummel

Lifted from the stories of the author's father and his German childhood and letters between her grandparents that were hidden in an attic wall for fifty years, *Motherland* focuses on a German family during WWII: a reconstructive surgeon loses his wife in childbirth and two months later marries a young woman who must look after the baby and his two grieving sons when he is drafted into medical military service. We follow her attempts to keep them safe as their German city is bombed by the Allies, their town is faced with the swelling population of desperate refugees, and one son begins to mentally unravel. Each family member's fateful choices lead them deeper into questions of complicity and innocence, to the novel's unforgettable conclusion.

Maria Hummel is a Stegner Fellow at Stanford University and her work has appeared in *Ploughshares, The Sun, The Believer* and has won a Pushcart Prize. Her first novel, *Wilderness Run* (SMP, 2002) was an alternate selection of Doubleday Lit Guild.

This slender yet powerful novel reimagines the true story of four young women who were among the first females to ever compete in the Olympic Games. It was the summer of 1928, and Valerie Patterson sensitively captures the time and place, the drama and the desire, the glory and the catastrophe of how these girls got there and what happened to them in Amsterdam that year. She follows as their lives unfold after the vote on allowing women to continue competing in the Olympics went against them.

Victoria Patterson is the author of *This Vacant Paradise* and the story collection *Drift*, which was a finalist for the Commonwealth Club Award and the Story Prize.

Lola Bensky is nineteen when Keith Moon drops his pants in front of her and Cher borrows her false eyelashes. It's the Sixties, and Lola is a reporter for an Australian newspaper, spending her days planning diets and interviewing rock stars. In London, Mick Jagger makes her a cup of tea and Jimi Hendrix propositions her; at the Monterey International Pop Festival, Lola props up Brian Jones and talks to Janis Joplin about sex; and in Los Angeles, she discusses her weight with Mama Cass and tries to pluck up the courage to ask Cher to return those false eyelashes. Luckily her parents have no idea she's hanging out with people who experiment with drugs and free love. They survived Aushwitz, but this would definitely kill them. As Lola moves through marriage, motherhood, psychoanalysis and a close relationship with an unexpected pair of detectives, she slowly discovers that the question of what it means to be human is the hardest one for anyone—including herself—to answer.

Lily Brett is one of Australia's most beloved, prolific and successful authors. She has published six works of fiction, seven books of poetry, and three essay collections.




ROCKAWAY by Tara Ison

Her exile leads to surprising revelations about her art, her heart, and how far she has drifted from the person she wants to be.


In this daring and hugely funny debut novel, eponymous protagonist Iris narrates an exuberant, comic and wistful picaresque about the struggles of growing up. Fresh out of college and on her own in Manhattan, Iris is utterly befuddled by what to do next. Whether passed out drunk in *The New Yorker's* cartoon office where she's interning; tanking her first job interview, assigning *Cliff's Notes* when hired to teach at a local college; aspiring to write the great American novel but settling for a blog about her ex-boyfriend's penis instead; trying to piece together the events of yet another puzzling blackout—"I prefer to call them pinkouts, because I'm a girl"—Iris is never short on misadventures. From quarter life crisis to the shock of turning 30, Iris charts a madcap, melancholic course through her rocky entry into the real world. Reminisicent of Lena Dunham's *Girl's*, but funnier.

Iris Smyles has contributed to a vast array of publications, including *Nerve, New York Press, McSweeny's*, and *BOMB*, among others. This is her first novel.

Despite the raging war between French and British, Scottish exile Duncan McCallum has begun to settle into a new life on the fringes of colonial America, traveling the woodlands with his companion Conawago, even joining the old Indian on his quest to find the last surviving members of his tribe. But the joy they feel on reaching the little settlement of Christian Indians is shattered when they find its residents ritually murdered. As terrible as the deaths may be, Conawago perceives something even darker and more alarming: he is convinced they are a sign of a terrible crisis in the spiritworld which he must resolve.


THE WRONG DOG DREAM by Jane Vandenburgh

Then their perfect pup grows up to be something of a neurotic mess, snarling at manhole covers, barking at children, growling at people in wheelchairs. 






THE CONSTANT HEART


SPIRITUAL AMERICAN TRASH: Portraits of the Margins of Art and Faith by Greg Bottoms

ONE HUNDRED PHILISTINE FORESKINS by Tova Reich

This astonishing novel by Tova Reich centers on the life of Temima Ba'alatOv, a charismatic woman rabbi of extraordinary spiritual power and learning, and an utterly original interpreter of the Hebrew Bible. Temima, known also as Ima Temima, or Mother Temima, is revered as a guru with prophetic, even messianic powers—one who dares to raise her woman's "naked" voice even in the face of extreme hostility by the traditional establishment. Moving between two worlds—Temima as a child in Brooklyn and Temima as an adult in Jerusalem—the story reveals the forces that shaped her, including the early loss of her mother; her spiritual and intellectual awakening; her complex relationship with her father, a ritual slaughterer; her forced marriage; her "ascent" to Israel; and her intense romantic involvements with charismatic men who launch her toward her destiny as a renowned woman leader in Israel.

Tova Reich is also the author of *My Holocaust* and *The Jewish War*.




THE NORTH POOL by Rajiv Joseph

Hostility between a Syrian high school student and his Vice Principal intensifies when another student's tragedy is brought to light. Truth shifts constantly in this riveting cat-and-mouse thriller from Pulitzer Prize finalist Rajiv Joseph. *The North Pool* is a psychological drama that weaves a timely character study about racial and cultural profiling in America, skillfully using an interrogation to peel away ever more unexpected layers of the characters' lives as they navigate an increasingly complex society.

Rajiv Joseph is an American playwright and a 2010 Pulitzer Prize Finalist for his play, *Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo*. His productions include *Gruesome Playground Injuries, Animals Out of Paper, The Leopard and the Fox, Huck & Holden,* and *All This Intimacy*.


ANTI LEBANON by Carl Shuker

It is Arab Spring and the fate of the Christians of the Middle East is uncertain. The many Christians of Lebanon are walking a knife-edge, their very survival in their ancestral refuge in doubt, as the Lebanese government becomes Hezbollah-dominated, while Syria convulses with warring religious factions. Anti Lebanon is a cross-genre political thriller and horror story embedded within these recent events, featuring a multi-ethnic Christian family living out the lingering after-effects of Lebanon's civil war as it struggles to deal with its phantoms, its ghosts, and its vampires.

Leon Elias is a young and impoverished Lebanese man whose older sister had joined a Christian militia and has been killed. He becomes caught up in the recent "little war" in Beirut, when the Shi'a resistance/militia Hezbollah takes over most of the city. In this milieu—the emptied streets of Christian east Beirut, the old shell-scarred sandstone villas, the echoing gunfire—he becomes involved, only partly by choice, in the theft of a seriously valuable piece of artisanal jewelry, and is bitten—like a vampire—by its Armenian maker.

Carl Shuker's first novel, *The Method Actors*, was awarded the "Prize in Modern Letters," the richest prize in the world for an emerging writer. His second novel, *The Lazy Boys*, is currently being developed into a film by director Brendan Donovan and producer Michael Wrenn.




DEALING WITH THE DEVIL: Inside America's Multi-Billion-Dollar Informant Industry by Dennis Fitzgerald

He assisted several post-Soviet countries draft laws governing the use of informants, helped create Lithuania's anti-corruption and witness security programs, and was on faculty at the FBI's International Training Academy in Budapest. Curzio Malaparte, an Italian born with a German heritage, was a journalist, dramatic, novelist and diplomat. When he wrote a book attacking totalitarianism and Hitler's reign, Mussolini, in no position to support such a body of work, stripped him of his National Fascist Party membership and sent him to internal exile on the island of Lipari. In 1941, he was sent to cover the Eastern Front as a correspondent for *Corriere della Sera*, the Milano daily newspaper. His dispatches from the next three years would be largely suppressed by the Italian government, but reverberated among readers as painfully real depictions of a landscape at war.

Walter Murch is an Academy Award winning film editor and sound designer. His body of work includes *The Rain People, American Graffiti, The Godfather Parts I-III, The Conversation, Apocalypse Now, Return to Oz, The English Patient*, and *Cold Mountain*. He has been nominated for nine Academy Awards, and has won three Oscars for his work on *Apocalypse Now* and *The English Patient*.



KEYHOLE FACTORY by William Gillespie

Set in an alternate present that is a slightly, if dangerously, skewed version of our own, *Keyhole Factory* tracks the interwoven destinies of disparate characters up to and beyond the end of the world-as-we-know-it, brought on by a global super-virus. Beginning with a biting satire of an academic poetry conference, the novel moves on to encompass the stories of a poet-astronaut, a microbiologist contemplating an exit strategy from her high-level job designing biological weapons, a sports-car-driving killer who stages the aesthetic murders of utopian commune-dwellers, and a lone pirate radio disc jockey who may be the last person left alive broadcasting her story to nobody.

Gillespie spins a glittering fever-dream that questions our assumptions about the way we interpret events and our relation to the planet, without ever losing sight of the underlying experience of what it feels like to be a human being in the world we live in today.

William Gillespie is the creator of a number of favorably reviewed small-press books, an award-winning hypertext novel, and the world's longest literary palindrome (so declared by Paul Braffort of the Oulipo). His writings have appeared in *American Book Review, Context, The Review of Contemporary Fiction*, and the & Now Award Anthology.




A PLACE IN TIME: Twenty Stories of the Port William Membership by Wendell Berry

For more than fifty years, Wendell Berry has been telling us stories about Port William, a mythical town on the banks of the Kentucky River, populated over the years by a cast of unforgettable characters living in a single place over a long time. In this new collection, the author's first piece of new fiction since the publication of Andy Catlett in 2006, the stories date's range from 1864, when Rebecca Dawe finds herself in her own reflection at the end of the Civil War, to one from 1991 when Grover Gibbs' widow, Beulah, attends the auction as her home place is offered for sale.

Those just now joining the Membership will be charmed. Those who've attended before will be enriched.

Wendell Berry is the author of more than fifty books of poetry, fiction, and essays. He was recently awarded the National Humanities Medal, the Cleanth Brooks Medal for Lifetime Achievement by the Fellowship of Southern Writers, and the Louis Bromfield Society Award.

TWO-PART INVENTIONS by Lynn Sharon Schwartz



Rather than mourn in peace, Philip becomes deeply paranoid: their life is based on a fraud and the acclaimed music the couple created is about to be exposed. Philip had built a career for his wife by altering her recordings by taking a portion of a song here and there from other pianists. Syncing the alterations seamlessly, he created a piece of flawless music with Suzanne getting sole credit.

In this urban, psychological novel, Schwartz brilliantly guides the reader through a flawed marriage and calculated career. Beginning with Suzanne's death and moving backwards in time, Schwartz examines their life together while contemplating the nature of truth, marriage, and the pursuit of perfection.

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
KORE: On Sickness, the Sick, and the Search for the Soul of Medicine by Andrez Sckeklik

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


ANARCHY! An Anthology of Emma Goldman's Mother Earth Edited by Peter Glassgold

THE SALT GOD'S DAUGHTER by Ilie Ruby



Set in Long Beach, California, beginning in the 1970s, *The Salt God's Daughter* follows Ruthie and her older sister Dolly as they struggle for survival in a place governed by an enchanted ocean and exotic folklore. Guided by a mother ruled by magical, elaborately-told stories of the full moons, the two girls are often homeless, often on their own, fiercely protective of each other, and unaware of how far they have drifted from traditional society as they carve a real life from their imagined stories.

The early death of their mother leads them to the Bethesda Home for Girls, where they come of age, running wild at night in the search for belonging and love. After an unplanned pregnancy, Ruthie ends a short, abusive marriage and discovers the first real home she has ever known: Wild Acres, an old hotel on the beach amidst giant bougainvilleas, glowing tides, and the spirits of sea animals. There, she finds refuge in an affair with a mysterious fisherman. Ruthie's daughter, Naida, is born into this magical landscape with an uncanny ability to swim and a secret she tries to keep hidden. Bullied by her peers, she finds solace in the ocean and embarks on the search for the father, who might know the true source of her gifts and her secrets.


AT DAWN by Jobie Hughes

Writer and lawyer Eric Berkowitz uses flesh-and-blood cases—much flesh and even more blood—to evoke the entire sweep of Western sex law, from the savage impalement of an Ancient Mesopotamian adulteress to the imprisonment of Oscar Wilde in 1895 for "gross indecency." 
